The 10th ISAGA summer school aims to offer the various viewpoints from different academic fields as well as promotes the practice of multidiscipline of urban planning and gaming simulation for the sustainable development and enhancement of planning looking to durability and resilience.

Gaming Simulation represents an effective practical instrument that helps to understand how the territorial system works by revealing the interconnections among its different parts, the "sensitive points", contradictions and changes. It also provides a safe environment, based on reality, in which participants can experience with decisions and negotiations. In this way, players also deal with the characteristics of the emerging social system whose behaviours represent the engine of territorial process.

Bridging gaps with our environmental awareness and behaviour through simulation & gaming for conserving cultural heritage under risk of disaster. Cultural heritage in the city around the world has been facing with severe risks of collapse or disappearance caused by global-scale environmental destruction and human activities. Increasing interest to global environment has contributed to awaken our sense of crisis on environmental changes and fostered understanding an importance of taking effective actions for conserving our cultural heritage. Growing attentions to conserving cultural heritage; however, the "tangible" actions at the civilian level are still in fragile.

Bridging gaps between environmental awareness and behaviour is now become one of the most important topics for planners, architects, geographers, engineers, geologist, sociologists, psychologists, and other experts on the conservation and revitalization of historical heritage.

Kinugasa Seminar House (youth hostel style with 4 beds in one room) The seminar house, about a ten-minute walk away from Kinugasa campus, is an educational research facility containing Japanese-style and western-style rooms for overnight accommodation, and meeting rooms. Maximum occupancy for the meeting rooms is 538 people, and up to 198 people may use the overnight accommodation. However, if participants wish, they

<>< Know RITSUMEIKAN UNIVERSITY (Kinugasa Campus)

The Kinugasa Campus is located in northwestern Kyoto, a 1200 year old city rich in culture and art. Representative of Japanese learning and culture, Kyoto is a center for universities and university students. Kinugasa Campus is surrounded by such auspicious temples as Kinkakuji, Ryoanji, Ninnaji, and Tojiin, a suitably tranquil setting for research and learning. Kinugasa consists of six colleges (Law, Social Sciences, International Relations, Policy Science, Letters, and Image Arts and Sciences) and eight graduate schools (Law, Sociology, International Relations, Policy Science, Letters, Science for Human Services, Language Education & Information Science, and Core Ethics & Frontier Sciences). The campus offers a comprehensive curriculum in the humanities and social sciences. The Inter-Faculty Institute for International Studies is also located at Kinugasa Campus.
